# LETTER FROM THE RECTOR That's another fine mess...

Some of the old Hollywood black and white comedies are still hilarious; one such is Laurel and Hardy. Like many comedies, they had a catch-phrase: "That's another fine mess you've gotten me into, Stanley". As I look around our situation it seems to feel like that the whole time. Our rivers are polluted; the kind of houses we want aren't built, but the kind we don't want are; our health service is, to put it mildly, struggling; discrimination and racism seem to be on the rise; we cannot control the effects of social media; our young people are increasingly without hope; economic growth appears impossible.

There are, of course, some good things happening, but overall, it appears we are on the slide.

What can we say about all these "messes"? I think it all points to a much deeper malaise. Commentators, thinkers and historians are all suggesting that we are in the twilight years of western civilisation and, as one indication of that, we have lost our uniting "story". That story was, of course, the Christian story. We can see how much of that is lost by our collective ignorance of the story, but also by the loss of the values that were held. Of the 10 commandments, those of theft and murder remain as values we aspire to, and even those two are under threat. Of the socalled seven deadly sins, perhaps only sloth is still seen as negative. The others are pride, greed, envy, wrath, lust, gluttony. Pride is celebrated (e.g. you must have pride in yourself...); without greed and envy our economy would soon collapse; wrath is everywhere on the internet, and the primeval urges of lust and gluttony are celebrated in advert and film. This diagnosis is now commonly accepted, to the extent that there is a call for a return to Christian values, without the faith and the content of the story behind it. Jordan Peterson is one such; Tom Holland another (although it seems he has come to a true faith recently). But it is not enough just to return to the values; we also need to accept the story and the spiritual life for it to work.

In this context, the words of Jesus of Nazareth are truly revolutionary. Your old medieval church may seem old-fashioned and reactionary, but in fact we follow a transforming belief. Our founder said, "Love your neighbour". "Love your enemy". "Lay down your life for your friends". "Give away your wealth". "Seek first God's Kingdom". "Do to others as you would have them do to you". "Whoever wants to be first must be slave of all". "Do not store up treasures on earth". No sign here of greed, or envy, or gluttony. Naturally we Christians fail, and fail often. (And the institution of the church has recently failed even more.) But to these values we aspire. And to the story we hold true.

As Easter approaches, the old story -that Jesus died and rose again, and sent his Holy Spirit - gives us both hope and power to carry on. To some it looks as though the church in the West will die. To me, when I see people hold to the words of Jesus and keep to the story, I know that is impossible. For it is a sign, in the messes around us, that God is in our midst, transforming our community. He will not leave us, because he loves us. He died for us and rose to new life.

In your old medieval churches, we still hold to the stories and to the words of Jesus; indeed, in the words of another old film, "The Greatest Story ever told". You are always welcome! *John Chitham* 

#### **COUNTRY MATTERS** (January 9<sup>th</sup>)

Of our winter bird visitors, Redwings are the first to arrive, as most of them come from Iceland which has virtually no berry- bearing bushes, whereas Fieldfares, coming as they do from Scandinavia, have such berries, which they consume before leaving. In the case of Woodcock, which probe soft wet ground for worms, hard frost would prevent them from feeding. As our frosty periods are spasmodic they come here, although just a few are resident in woodland of a certain nature.

From now until late February we will not be expecting any calves, but it is different with the sheep. The ewes have just had their usual prelambing injections, covering six or seven diseases. They are due to lamb from about February 1<sup>st</sup> onwards.

### BIRD OF THE MONTH Lesser Spotted Woodpecker

Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers used to be fairly common here, at least one pair breeding on the farm, but the terrible gales of 1987 broke off the dead branches in which they used to drill their nest holes. There are still a few in areas unaffected by that gale, but I haven't seen one here for several years. In appearance their plumage is similar to their large cousin, being about the size of a sparrow with a barred back.

#### DANE END DEFIBRILLATOR & VETS NUMBER

Please be aware there is a Public Access Defibrillator situated in the telephone box in a locked cabinet next to Dane End Stores. The code for the cabinet can be obtained by ringing 999. However there is also Village Emergency Telephone System (VETS) that enables up to 10 "good neighbours" to assist pending the arrival of the emergency services. VETS uses a simple memorable number unique to the village (01920 282999). This system can also be used for any emergency where additional help is required from neighbours, whether Cardiac Arrest or not. VETS volunteers are also aware of the code to access the cabinet if it is required. VETS does not replace 999 calls. Always ring 999 first in an emergency.



#### Save The Boot: A Community Pub for Generations to Come

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

The Save the Boot committee have been working in the background to ensure we have the where-withall to save the Boot and this message is a plea to you all to help us save the pub.

We are at a pivotal moment for Dane End. Our much-loved pub, The Boot, is at risk of permanent closure. Once lost, this treasured village hub cannot be replaced.

Our plan is simple yet ambitious: to establish a Community Benefit Society (CBS) that will own and manage The Boot for the good of all. This means the pub will belong to the community—to us and NOT to a property developer!

What we need: To make this dream a reality, we need to raise c.£600,000 in total. The funds will cover:

- £5,000 for essential surveys and professional advice (immediate need!)
- C.£380,000 to purchase the building
- C.£215,000 to restore and relaunch The Boot as a thriving pub

We hoped to secure up to £200,000 in grant funding from the Community Ownership Fund (COF) which was a government scheme to help gain funding for saving community assets such as pubs, shops, etc. However, the COF was paused for the election and has now been closed by the current government.

This leaves us with a huge sum to raise in order to secure the Boot for the community. The lions share of the amount needed must come from us—the local community. Every pound pledged brings us closer to owning and preserving this iconic building for future generations.

Why it matters: The Boot is more than just a pub. It's a place where friendships flourish, stories are shared, and community bonds grow stronger. Imagine The Boot buzzing with life again—a warm, welcoming space where we can gather for a pint, a meal, or a village event. Saving The Boot is about preserving our heritage and creating a lasting legacy.

How you can help right now: We need to know if the community is able to dig deep into their pockets and help fund the purchase and renovations of the Boot. You can pledge support by emailing us on the address below. We need to know who you are and how much you are willing to pledge.

NB: the forming of a CBS will mean owning shares in the Boot. More details on this will be shared once we know we can usefully strive forward.

Once we know that we can raise funds from the community (or not) we can move forward very swiftly.

Please act today. Every contribution and every pledge, large or small, makes a difference. Together, we can ensure The Boot's future as a community-owned pub.
